School Uniform Policy

Rationale

Our school values pride in personal appearance and encourages the self-esteem and confidence that students obtain from appropriate personal presentation and hygiene.

Vision

St. Therese's School strives to be a faith and learning community which celebrates God's presence through: our Catholic heritage, excellence in teaching and learning and a strong partnership between family, parish and staff.

Mission

- " ... respect in the dignity of each person."
- "... the development of self worth and human dignity of each person."
- "The creation of an environment which fosters mutual respect and cooperation."

Basic Beliefs

A smart uniform establishes a sense of pride and belonging, purpose and identity among students

- A school uniform is non-discriminatory and does not distinguish between students from different socio-economic backgrounds.
- The expense of purchasing a uniform is offset by the reduced expense of purchasing other clothes.
- A uniform ensures that students do not feel pressured into keeping up with the latest fashion.
- A uniform presents a united image to the public and can be easily identifiable in the community.
- A school with a clearly defined uniform makes a statement in the community and creates perceptions of a sense of order and discipline within that school environment.
- It is easy for a yard duty teacher to see if there are any unwelcome visitors within the school environment.

Aims / Goals

- To engender personal pride and dignity.
- To create a sense of identity
 - children identify themselves as members of St Therese's School community.
 - the wider community identifies the students as members of St Therese's school community.

- To contribute to a safe and aesthetically pleasing environment.
- To promote equity among students.

Guidelines for Implementation

- The correct uniform, both formal and sport, is outlined in the Parent Handbook. The information in this handbook is reviewed and updated each year.
- The complete school uniform is to be worn on all occasions unless other arrangements have been specifically made eg "free-dress" day, child's birthday.
- The school has the choice of a broad brim or bucket hat as part of uniform. The wearing of school hats is compulsory from September 1st to April 30th.
- All students are expected to have uniform items clearly and permanently labelled.
- All items of uniform must be kept clean and in good condition at all times. Shoes must be cleaned and polished.
- Children may not deface their uniform in any way. It is expected that damaged or badly worn items would be replaced promptly.
- Uniform guidelines extend to include the following points
 - Only Christian or medical alert necklaces can be worn.
 - Only watches or medical alert bracelets can be worn
 - Hair accessories to be school colours (Hair below collar length must be tied up).
 - Ear piercing is the only piercing acceptable and limited to one per ear. Studs are the preferred earning.
- Students who are not in school uniform must bring a note of explanation from their parent/guardian.
- Responsibility for following these guidelines applies to students, but the responsibility for being in appropriate school uniform is shared with parents.
- It is expected that all staff would be clear about the uniform standards and that regular monitoring of the uniform would be done by classroom teachers.

Exceptions to school uniform rules

- 1. If a product or item has been brought into the uniform there will be a phase in and phase out period.
- 2. At the start of term 2 and at the end of term 3 there will be a 2 weeks allowance for students to change from one type of uniform to the other i.e. from winter to summer uniform and vice versa.

Evaluation

This policy is to be reviewed regularly as part of the school's cyclical policy review schedule.
